From the Minister's study— Christmas 2021

Another lockdown over Christmas? "It would be like trying to put the cork back into an open bottle of champagne" according to a French politician. And the UK government has no plans to restrict our movements although we are urged to be very cautious (and to take regular lateral flow tests) as we meet up with family and friends over Christmas. This means that we can be on the move—and that is what we often do at Christmas. Some people travel to holiday destinations abroad while many people travel home for Christmas.

Coming home or getting home is a desire, a longing, many of us share and it is especially powerful at this time of the year. Returning home for Christmas—people may be looking forward to it for weeks, months or perhaps even a whole year. Children who are living away from home, or perhaps even abroad, families separated, loved ones in hospital, army and civilian personnel on foreign assignments, etc. Home is where we try to get to, in time for Christmas!

Living outside of our homeland, already for so many years, and Christmas being a day that we are usually "at work," Michael and I have had to supress our urge to "go home" for Christmas, instead celebrating Christmas back home on boxing day or have family and friends come to us for Christmas so that we could be "at home." Yes, at this time of the year many of us long to go home or come home or have loved ones come home to us—and this also means that for many it may be a time that they are keenly aware that a loved one is no longer coming home or at home with us. It can be a very difficult time, Christmas!

But what is it about home? What is the home at Christmas that we remember, that we are longing for, that we miss, that we go back to or that we make?

In the novel, Home, by Marilynne Robinson, Jack has a difficult relationship with his father, a minister, for the whole of his life. He is the misfit in the family, always in trouble, alienated from his father—a prodigal son. But towards the end of his father's life Jack comes home. He reflects with his sister, "I just wanted to come home. I wanted to see the place, I wanted to see my father... I was scared to come...." He thinks he might leave again soon but his sister tells him, "If you ever need to come home again, I'll be there."

You could say home is in our DNA. Even if you have had a difficult time growing up in your family or have or had a complicated relationship with your parents or siblings, you may still long for home—and really miss it when never having had a proper home.

But not only do we long for a "family" home, we are also searching for "home" in our journey of faith. "O come, o come Immanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here...." As exiles we search for home—a home of a world of peace and goodwill. "Glory to God, on earth be peace, goodwill to all shall never cease."

But for peace to reign and goodwill never to cease we have the calling, the duty to care for the world and all people. At Christmas many give very generously to charities, among which those that support and bring something of a Christmas "home feel" to the homeless rough sleepers on our streets as well as those that reach out to the asylum seekers and refugees that have had to leave their homes and home country to find safety elsewhere. For the world's homeless, in the literal and figurative sense, home will be where people experience the real presence of kindness, love and peace.

Yes, we all long to come "home" and while we may not be there yet, we know the way that leads to it.

"I cannot claim that I have found the home that I long for every day of my life, not by a long shot, but I believe in my heart that I have found and maybe have always known, the way that leads to it. I believe that the home I long for and finally belong to is where Christ is. I believe that home is Christ's kingdom, which exists both within us and among us as we wind our prodigal ways through the world in search of it" (Frederick Buechner)

And as we wind our prodigal ways through the world....

"Weary or bitter or bewildered as we may be, God is faithful. He lets us wander so that we will know what it means to come home." (Marilynne Robinson)

And so it is. At Christmas we remember that we are both wandering in search of home and yet we are also always coming home in the world, the world in which LOVE came down at Christmas. And we are also called to make it a true home for all God's people and all God's creatures, great and small, rich and poor, loved and unloved, lost and found, sick and healthy, stranger and estranged. And then all will rejoice and sing, Joy to the world, the Lord is come!

With all best wishes for a peaceful and joyful Christmas!

An Advent Message from the Moderator: Are we nearly there yet?

"Are we nearly there yet?" is a cry that probably most parents will remember, from bored children in the back seat of the car.

Are we nearly there yet? It's something we want to ask about the end of the pandemic. It's still too early to decide that. As I write, some European countries are entering renewed lockdowns, and Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland are all increasing restrictions, albeit in a fairly limited way so far. Whether England will move to the Government's "Plan B" for the winter is yet to be seen.

Are we nearly there yet? Can we start to call ministers to fill vacancies around the Synod. Aha! Some good news here, again even if in a fairly limited way. We are now moving forwards with creating a number of new posts for Stipendiary Ministers, although we know we will never have a large enough quota to satisfy anyone. We are having to learn how we might lead our churches differently, but at least we are getting nearer to calling some new Ministers to the West Midlands.

Are we nearly there yet? Many—and I think almost all—churches have found that a significant number of people are still reluctant to return to in-person worship and activities. Certainly, every church I've spoken with are finding that volunteers to keep the church running and engaging in missional activities are harder to find. Can we get back to "normal"? No. And let's not try. The old "normal" was already broken before Covid; we do need to embrace a new way of being and doing things in God's service, not just because of the pandemic, but it has certainly had a major ongoing impact.

Are we nearly there yet? Christmas "celebrations" continue to start earlier. I did see what is very definitely a Christmas tree in a neighbour's house in the third week of November—not only before Advent but before even Christ the King Sunday. (I know many of my neighbours like to light up their homes for Diwali and other faith festivals; this was very clearly a Christmas tree.) But where, in these early celebrations, is there room for Christ?

The Church is called not to conform to the values of the world (Romans 12) but instead to allow our mind to be renewed. Let us be those open to the renewing Holy Spirit, ready to learn new things about ourselves and, more importantly, God. I don't believe we will do that through decorations put up ever earlier (and removed on Boxing Day). I do believe we will grow in the waiting, like the prophets, and the searching, like the Magi. I do believe we can find renewed purpose and hope as we set out to welcome anew Christ into our homes and our churches. Will you come with me on this journey?
