From the Minister's study—

Dear Friends,

“Should there be a clock in the sanctuary?” was a question once asked to me. Yes, there should be. Why? So that at least I, or any preacher in the “pulpit,” know/s what time it is. In many places around the world, congregations don't care what time it is and services can go on for hours. But I think that is not the case in most churches in the UK. We usually like a service to be no longer than one hour. And actually, a service may not even last one hour anymore when sermons are shorter and fewer hymns are sung, since after Covid. But then, the fellowship after the service is also a very important part of our Sunday gathering, when we have “holy” or “less holy” conversations over a cup of coffee or tea.

Not only on Sunday morning but all through the week we keep track of time. Calendars and clocks have become our masters in our fast-paced modern society. But did you know that the idea of our lives and the events in them being controlled by a time frame of hours and minutes is relatively new? The idea came from Benedictine monks, whose passion for organizing and filling every minute of the day grew out of St. Benedict's conviction that “idleness is the enemy of the soul.” Not until the 15th century did clocks begin to rival churches in the town squares of Europe. And not until the 17th century did those clocks have minute hands.

Surely much was gained in terms of production and organization, when life became divided and subdivided into seconds, minutes and hours. But just as surely, many things were lost. We experience the effects. Our distance from the natural rhythms of life keeps increasing. For instance, hardly anything is really seasonal anymore and I do not only refer to food, for instance, but also to how we organize our daily lives. And we also live at an increasing distance from the ancient but timeless understanding that each day, each moment is a gift from a gracious God.

It was the philosopher or teacher of wisdom who was called in Hebrew Qohelet (which we know as Ecclesiastes in Greek) who understood

time very differently from the way it is understood today. He wrote after the Babylonian exile, an experience that had taught the Hebrew people that life was not always going to be easy, and that time should not be a tyrant that demanded all our allegiance.

Qohelet writes about the seasons of life, each an undeniable part of human existence. His list rings so true to experience that we often read it, as written in Ecclesiastes chapter 3, at funerals. For it begins with that which is the most fundamentally true. One day, we are born into this world and then, just as inevitably, our life in this world comes to an end.

For Qohelet, things are what they are, set in motion by God. The universe unfolds according to its own inner logic and set of seasons. Why life is set up the way it is, God only knows, but Qohelet's advice is: "The best thing to do is to be happy and enjoy yourself for as long as you live." That is theological advice at its practical best.

Since there are so many things over which we have no control, and will never have control, it is wise to be happy and to enjoy oneself as long as we live.

The other thing he recommends, his other prescription for life other than not worrying about what you cannot control and enjoying the gifts God gives you, is that always and forever we are to stand in awe before God, from whose mighty acts nothing can be added or taken away. God is the creator of time, and there is a natural rhythm to reality—a time to mourn and a time to dance, a time to get and a time to let go. It is our job to know what time it is.

Some hold on desperately to that which is coming to an end, or has actually come to an end... even life itself. We hold on because letting go is so much more difficult. But, there is a time to build up and a time to break down, a time to be born and a time to die.

And so it is that churches, local congregations, also have to reckon with time, recognizing whether it is time to carry on or time to "let go." Is it time to still try to build up a congregation, with God's help, or is it the

right time to decide that it is time to “move on” and “move out” a cherished church building, while thankful for the many years of faithful ministry and service? Is it time to mourn or is it time to dance, trusting that God will always be with us and lead us to new ventures of life and faith elsewhere?

Of course there is sadness that Bournville URC has decided to close as a congregation but there is a real sense that the right decision has been made, at the right time, and we can certainly rejoice that lasting friendships have been made in our life together as a “family” of faith (see the write-up elsewhere in this newsletter!) and that we may look forward to fresh possibilities as members in other faith communities.

And so we are getting ready for the closing service on the 9th of July, which I hope many members of the Cadbury pastorate churches as well as friends of Bournville URC can attend. In this service we will share memories and we will give God thanks for the life and work of the faith community which has served as witness of God’s presence in the community of Bournville for so many years. It has provided refuge, comfort, joy and challenges for many generations of God’s people worshipping and meeting in the church building. And we will rejoice that the building will still be used for worship and activities as Rowheath Pavilion has signed a lease for its use.

Yes, we will rejoice. For in every time and in every place, we are to be joyful and grateful people. Sr Joan Chittister in her book entitled *There Is a Season* writes, “Joy is the Spirit of God in time” It is the way we taste eternity within the boundaries of time.
