#### From the Editor—

How long have I been doing this? The newsletter, that is. Most of the time since Tom Arthur's stroke in 1997, aside from a break of a few years when Pat Weaver took over. The newsletter hasn't always been the same—I remember when it was a few typed and duplicated pages from John Geyer, with rather formal minutes from church groups. It changed to include more material from more sources during Tom Arthur's time, was added to the church website sometime during George's tenure, and changed to a booklet format 10 years ago. *[Note: if you find the booklet print too small to read comfortably, please let Ted or me know, and we will provide copies with larger print.]* 

The loss of church members and lockdown led to first to a Weoley Hill/Weoley Castle newsletter, then to a Cadbury Pastorate version and now we're back to Weoley Hill & Weoley Castle. (You'll have to ask Ted Forgan for the history of the Weoley Castle newsletter.) Just one example of continuity and change in our church life—what next? Ted and I will keep the current newsletter going for the time being, at least until we know what is next for our churches.

And what *is* next for our churches? The actual make-up and procedures of the new Central & Southwest Birmingham Pastorate are still being decided. The next meeting of the Vacancy Call Group, which has the responsibility of working out the details for approval by the congregations concerned, is Tuesday 24 September. Please pray for everyone concerned and that the good will shown at our first meeting continues. And please pray that the eventual calling of a minister leads to continuation of the Lord's work with the renewal and change needed.

There are issues to resolve and questions yet to be answered: What about the Weoley Castle Manse? Where will a new Pastorate Manse be located? How will the preaching rota work? How will time, responsibilities and work be divided for all of us, not just the minister? Change isn't always comfortable, and it can take a while to find the right balance of change and continuity. While one temptation is to chase after the next new shiny thing, another is to retreat into idealised memories of how things used to be, as though they were divinely ordained. (My late grandfather, who lived through poverty , war and very hard times, always said 'The best thing about the good old days is a poor memory'.) Sure, there were good things about life when I was a child, or when X was minister, or... but there was also plenty that very much needed to change.

In times of change like these—and when hasn't it been a time of change?—we see people who resort to violence to demand change and people who resort to violence to oppose it. We may sympathise with one cause or another; we may debate the right way to respond to violent attack; we surely sympathise with and pray for the victims of violence. But Jesus taught us that everyone is our neighbour, no matter what their ethnicity, background, religion, way of life, no matter what.

As Christians, we pray for God's guidance and for his will to be done, change or no change, even if it is personally uncomfortable or inconvenient. We pray that we can hold to what is true, but be agents for the change that God wills. As the prayer goes, *God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can\*, and the wisdom to know the difference. \*Must,* in some older versions. Or we might prefer the activist version *If I'm not home accepting what I can't change, I'm probably out changing what I can't accept.* 

At this time of change for our churches, I hope we can reflect and honestly pray *Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.* And be ready to be the agents of his will, through his grace, in change and continuity.
