Dear friends

When I was asked to write this letter for this month's newsletter, what came to my mind immediately were two things. Harvest and John Keats poem To Autumn with its opening line 'The season of mists and mellow fruitfulness'.

I am not generally a lover of poetry and do not have much knowledge of it, so I went to the internet to read and listen to the poem.

To quote from Wikipedia: In To Autumn, John Keats paints three perfect autumnal landscapes in three powerful stanzas. He also highlights the impact on the senses which occur to the patient observer.

Scholars have unanimously decreed that 'To Autumn' is one of the most perfect poems in the English language, despite being his last.

This month we are now really beginning to feel the autumn chills evening and morning and can wake to find the mist has come down on several occasions. Summer has gone but we can still get sunny days despite all the torrential rain we have had during September, particularly on Thursday 26th, when so many roads and gardens were flooded. One would expect the trees to be changing colour but with all the rain during the summer and recently the leaves are still green apart from the horse chestnut trees along the Bristol Road near the Orthopaedic hospital. Another effect of climate change, rain to excess and delay in autumn colours. How is the wildlife coping does it know it is time to store food for the winter or to migrate north or south depending on the type of bird or animal?

Keats describes autumn beautifully. The first stanza addresses the atmosphere of autumn, the second one compare it to a goddess and the third almost mourns the loss of spring but points out there is

still plenty of life in the flora and fauna. The mellow fruitfulness sums up the richness of the harvest time when so many plants produce their fruit at this time of year and animals and insects prepare for winter by storing food.

The seasons are part of God's creation. The cycle of life in the trees and plants losing their leaves or cutting down on the moisture they take from the ground, resting in the winter months to come to life again in spring. Evergreen trees continue to grow in winter but more slowly.

This time of year is normally one of my favourite seasons with the autumn colours and chilly days so our home is warm and cosy. I cannot let this pass without thinking about those people in fuel poverty and having to make the choice of heat or eat. I support the food bank each week but what can we do more as a church. We at Weoley Hill tried conversation times last winter without mentioning it was a warm space what can we do this year? Weoley Castle have a warm space and clothes swap among other things.

Our harvest has its roots in biblical times when the first fruits were offered to God. So, our harvest service is a service of thanksgiving for all God's gifts.

All good gifts around us
Are sent from heaven above,
So thank the Lord, O thank the Lord
For all his love.

Pastorate News

Update on pastorate group

The South and Central Birmingham pastorate will consist of 4 churches: Carr's Lane Church, Cotteridge Church, Weoley Castle Community Church and Weoley Hill URC.

There were Methodist ministers at Carr's Lane and Cotteridge as they are Local Ecumenical Partnership (LEPs), but both have either moved on or are about to do so. This means the 4 churches are without a fulltime minister so the urgency to put ourselves forward as a vacant group is getting more so. The 4 churches will each write their own profile and then a summary sheet will be compiled to sell us all to any potential minister. We are all getting on with this.

There are major changes going ahead at Carr's Lane Church as the site will be sold and redeveloped but it will be stipulated that some space in the site will be as a church.

We still have to find a pastorate banker/treasurer and open an account in the name of the pastorate so funds can be available for the minister's expenses.

Also, the synod will have to purchase a manse somewhere between the Bristol and Pershore roads that has easy access to public transport for environmental reasons to save car usage.

Keep praying for the work of the Vacancy group and the potential new minister.



Local young man in the 2025 Guinness World Records book!



We asked Daniel Teplitski if he'd share his thoughts and achievements with the Newsletter:

Since the age of 8 I've been training in the genre of 'power juggling' (juggling, balancing and doing various tricks with heavy weights) under the supervision and coaching from my father Oleg Teplitski who also did this.

My parents run Elite Academy: the dance/gymnastics classes at Weoley Castle Community Church. My mom was a professional dancer and my father a third-generation circus artist.

As a child I performed on a show with Stephen Mulherne, the 'Little Big Shots' TV show with Dawn French and won a Global Child Prodigy Award. This year as a 20-year-old I was chosen from 70,000 people worldwide to perform on the world's biggest stage: AGT (America's Got Talent) in California. I received 4 yes's and a standing ovation from judges in front of an audience of 4000 people. I met lots of great artists from all over the world and saw Los Angeles for the first time: memories I will treasure and an experience I will never forget.



Now the book is on sale, I can finally reveal that I have just been awarded a Guinness World Record (for twirling a pair of 20 kg cannonballs around above my head 26 times in 30 seconds—see the picture!) and I'm fortunate enough

to be included in the 2025 edition of the book.



I would like to thank people at Weoley Castle Community Church, who have supported and believed in me over the years. I'm very grateful and I will continue to work hard and strive to achieve the best I can from myself.

Some shops will accept all kinds of tech and electric goods for recycling, including those stray leads that don't seem to belong to anything, whether or not you're buying something at the moment.
